Minutes of Monthly Meeting for Business - Fourth Month 11th

Providence Monthly Meeting Fourth Month (April) 11, 2010

Minutes of monthly meeting for business

1. The meeting opened at 12:15 pm at the Providence meetinghouse with thirteen Friends present. During the opening worship the clerk read the following queries, from the *Faith and Practice* of Intermountain Yearly Meeting (2008):

Does each of us take our right share of responsibility in work and service for the meeting? What gifts do we offer? What do we hold back from offering? What do we have tied up that God has need of?

2. Announcements:
The noon worship sharing at Providence meetinghouse on the 25th of this month will consider our meeting's relationship with Friends United Meeting.

There will be a monthly meeting May Breakfast and a Quarterly Meeting Extended Worship at the Providence Meetinghouse on 1 Fifth Month. There are many opportunities for Friends who wish to be involved. Contact John Lord concerning the breakfast or the clerk concerning the Extended Worship.

Next month, our Meeting for Worship with a concern for business will be 13 Fifth Month (a Fifth Day) at 7 p.m. at the Providence Meetinghouse. There will be a potluck dinner downstairs at 6 p.m. Please contact the clerk if you are in need of transportation.

- 3. Membership: For Ministry and Counsel, Bob Elliott recommended that Lee Jaspers be accepted into membership in the meeting. Friends approved. Bob Elliott, Elsie Morse, and Bruce Carlsten agreed to arrange an appropriate welcoming event.
- 4. Nominating Committee Report: Elsie Morse presented preliminary recommendations for service to the meeting for the coming year, for our information. The committee will continue to fill in a few vacancies and bring a final report to next month's meeting for business.
- 5. First Day School State of Society Report:
 Elizabeth Oakley presented the annual State of Society Report prepared by (and approved by) the second through eighth graders. A copy is printed elsewhere in the newsletter. We thank the First Day School for its careful, concise, and well-written account.
- 6. Statistical Report: In the absence of the Recorder, the clerk presented the statistical report for calendar 2009, which has already been sent to the Yearly Meeting office. We note the net loss of seven members: three dropped through correction of a clerical error, eight discontinued as inactive over-twenty-five junior members, and four additions by request.
- 7. For Ministry and Counsel, Dan Lederer presented a proposal that the meeting hold a one-day workshop in the fall of 2010, with leadership from Friends General Conference, to explore undertaking the

Quaker Quest program. Betsy Zimmerman is already a trained Quaker Quest leader. If the meeting decides to participate, FGC requests that as many people attend the workshop as normally attend meeting for worship, which for us would be 55 to 65 people.

Quaker Quest is an outreach program developed by Friends in Britain Yearly Meeting, in which the host meeting holds a series of public sessions, usually on weekday evenings, on various topics. The intent of Quaker Quest is to invite seekers from outside the meeting who may be interested in Quakerism but do not know much about it.

It was suggested that any outreach efforts involve staff and families at the Quaker schools and students at Brown. Some Friends were skeptical about being able to attract the requested number of attenders for the one-day workshop. Others felt that given the proportion of our membership that is over 65 years old, it would be useful to do more outreach especially to students and young families. Saylesville Friends have also discussed ways to do outreach into the community.

Friends asked Ministry and Counsel to provide further information about the Quaker Quest program (including a link to the FGC website) and a tentative date for the workshop, and to bring this proposal back to a future meeting.

8. Proposed Budget for FY 2011: For the Finance Committee, Bruce Carlsten presented a proposed budget for the fiscal year that will run from June 1, 2010 to May 31, 2011. He highlighted the significant changes from the current year.

It was noted that Ministry and Counsel recommended a larger increase in the donation to New England Yearly Meeting, to offset some of the reduced donations from other meetings. The Finance Committee considered this request, incorporating input from a meeting of finance people from throughout the Yearly Meeting that our committee clerk and treasurer attended. The Yearly Meeting appreciates steady giving, with sustainable increases, rather than dramatic changes from year to year. The Finance Committee therefore recommend a modest increase for this year. Ministry and Counsel and Finance Committees will continue to consult about this line in future vears.

Friends approved the FY 2011 budget as presented.

9. Virtual Office for Meeting: For the Communications Committee, Dan Lederer presented a proposal regarding a meeting "virtual office," which would serve as a digital repository of meeting information such as minutes, treasurer's reports, contracts, grants, demographic data, etc. The intention is to maintain much of this information in a password-protected section of the meeting's website. The proposal is intended to

My time in Palestine was eye opening and I feel a responsibility to share some of my small learnings with people back in the United States."

fill a need for a single source of information and key documents for the meeting.

It was noted that digital media do not survive technological changes unless there is a diligent effort to transfer information to new formats. Documents in hard copy are more durable for the historical record, and more accessible to some. Maintaining paper files takes organization as well as space; maintaining digital files also requires time and attention. The Yearly Meeting archives also requests copies of

minutes and other records on durable paper.

We appreciate the Communications
Committee's efforts to remedy the existing gap in our storage of and access to key documents. We authorize the committee to proceed with the proposed digital repository, as a trial measure, while also working on a better physical repository for documents and more attention to transferring documents to the Yearly Meeting archives.

10. Treasurer's Report: In the absence of the Treasurer, Bruce Carlsten presented an interim treasurer's report for the current fiscal year ending May 31, 2010. The finance committee projects that we will end the year in the black, allowing for a modest replenishment of the meeting's general reserve fund.

11. Saylesville: Joanne Griffin reported that no business meeting was held this month due to the threshing sessions. The appropriate committees are working on a proposal for the next phase of renovations to the Saylesville meetinghouse.

12. The meeting closed with a period of grateful worship, intending to meet again at the Providence meetinghouse on 5th month 13 at 7 pm following a potluck supper.

Quaker Quest By Dan Lederer

Quaker Quest began as an outreach project developed in 2002 at Friends House in London. It consists of a series of 2-hour sessions that are open to the public and that address various topics such as "Quakers and Worship", "Quakers' Experience of God", and "Quakers and the Practice of Peacemaking", with a typical session consisting of brief presentations by three speakers, group discussions, questions and answers, and an explanation of Meeting for Worship, plus an opportunity for participation in silent worship as well as refreshments and socializing. The goal is to promote Quakerism as a spiritual path for our time that includes a search for the sacredness of each person, an encounter with the divine through the power of stillness, and a commitment to the ways of equality and nonviolence. At the same time, in clarifying and speaking of

their faith experience, Friends have found the process to be a valuable means of inreach and strengthening of their Quaker communities.

Friends General Conference (FGC), of which NEYM is a member, is encouraging its constituent monthly meetings to consider Quaker Quest programs. The recommended first step in doing so is to host a "motivation and inspiration" workshop for meeting members and attenders only. The workshop is led by two facilitators provided by FGC and can run for a full day or a half day (for example, a First Day afternoon), with the expectation that there is a high level of participation by the host meeting.

Hosting a workshop obligates us to provide transportation, meals, and lodging for the two facilitators but does not

require a commitment to proceed with Quaker Quest. Rather, it allows prospective participants to have their questions answered and to practice presentations and group interactions. At some point after the workshop we will need to discern whether to proceed. If the sense of Meeting is to do so, there follows a period of time, at least several months. during which we decide on session topics, determine dates of sessions, plan publicity, and hold training sessions for those who will be involved. In considering the above details, Ministry and Counsel has envisioned holding the workshop this coming fall, perhaps mid-November. with an initial series of sessions, perhaps three, in the spring of 2011 and again the following fall.

Looking ahead to our next Meeting for Business, which will take place on Thursday evening May 13, Ministry and Counsel will ask Meeting to approve our hosting a Quaker Quest workshop in November. In considering this proposal, Friends are encouraged to find out more about Quaker Quest by going to www.quakerquestfgc.org. This site will answer a lot of your questions, and there is a link to the British site as well.
