Providence Monthly Meeting for Business Minutes- Sixth Month 12th

Providence Monthly Meeting 12 Sixth Month 2011

1. We gathered at the Saylesville meetinghouse at 12:18 p.m., with thirteen friends present. In the opening worship the clerk read an advice on mindfulness from the Proposed Advices of New England Yearly Meeting (2009):

Be aware of the Spirit at work in the ordinary activities and experience of your daily life. There is inspiration to be found all around us, in the natural world, in the sciences and arts, in our work and friendships, in our sorrows as well as in our joys.

2. Announcements

The deadline for registration for Sessions for New England Yearly Meeting (6 - 11 Eighth Month) is the 30th of this month. Friends are also reminded that a fund is available to assist those who wish to attend but find the cost an obstacle. Information is in this month's edition of *The New England Friend*. Copies are available in the entryway of the Providence meetinghouse.

The meeting yard sale is planned for 1st of 10th month, with a silent auction the evening before. The ad hoc committee is actively looking for volunteers for many tasks, as well as items for both the silent auction and the sale the next day. Friends are encouraged to sign up on the chart at Providence meetinghouse.

3. The ad hoc yard sale committee would like flexibility in allocating the proceeds. The current proposal is to give half to the Institute for the Study and Practice of Non-Violence and half to be allocated later. This is a slight change from what was announced in 2d month, because given the number of natural disasters, the committee would like flexibility to respond to new needs that may arise. In the past the proceeds have been divided between the meeting and AFSC or other causes. Friends approved the proposed allocation, noting that Providence Meeting might be included among the organizations to be considered for the second 50%.

4. Meeting representatives to AFSC-SENE: Bruce Carlsten and Sarah Morenon are both willing to continue serving as the meeting's representatives to the AFSC-SENE support committee. Friends approved. Bruce noted that the committee would welcome other volunteers from within the meeting community.

5. Membership matters: Recorder Anne DiMase reported that Jessie Kerr, a non-resident member, has asked to resign her membership. We accept this resignation. Lydia Maier has requested a transfer of her membership to Portland (ME) Friends Meeting, where she is now attending. We refer this request to Ministry & Counsel for action.

6. NEYM Sessions: Rebecca Leuchak reported on plans for NEYM Sessions that may affect our monthly meeting. The day before the meeting begins, Friday, August 5, there will be a celebration at the Great Meetinghouse in Newport, which includes a service opportunity at the Martin Luther King community center. The planning committee hopes that local Friends will sit on the facing bench and may volunteer to help coordinate the service project. An ad hoc committee is putting together a history display to honor the 350th birthday of NEYM. There are opportunities for local Friends to provide beverages and perhaps desserts. Participants are being asked to provide their own picnic suppers; it may be useful to have some food available. The evening program will include an excerpt from the musical production, "The Fire and the Hammer," which will be performed in full on the Tuesday evening of NEYM Sessions. Singers will be rehearsing at Providence meetinghouse earlier in the week and may need hospitality among us.

The clerk reported that he had followed up on the request from the "Fire and the Hammer" group to use the meeting's piano. The piano is not needed at Bryant University. We believe that our insurance would cover the piano in Newport but not in transit. The NEYM office might be willing to assist in the unlikely event of damage. With this further information, Friends approved having the piano transported to Newport for this purpose.

7. Finance Committee: For the Finance Committee, Bill Monroe brought the following recommendation for treatment of large gifts or bequests:

Any single contribution of \$5,000 or more that is clearly not part of a regular annual contribution from a member or attender, nor otherwise restricted, should constitute a special case, and the Finance Committee would make a recommendation to the Meeting for its distribution.

The committee noted that the \$5,000 amount is about 6.5% of the proposed budget for next year, and should be subject to change in future years as the size of the budget changes, but that a round dollar figure will be easier to keep in mind than a figure based on percentage of the budget. The policy was approved.

8. Ministry and Counsel: Bruce Shaw brought a proposal from Ministry and Counsel for use of the meetinghouse for events such as weddings or memorial meetings by individuals connected with Moses Brown School, as follows:

The meetinghouse is the place of worship for the Moses Brown community, and as a result many alumni, faculty, and staff have found a spiritual connection to the meetinghouse. In recognition of the unique relationship between Moses Brown School and Providence Monthly Meeting, the meetinghouse can be made available for the use of Moses Brown community members for events such as memorial services or weddings. The Director of Friends Education at Moses Brown School will be the contact person for the school, working with the meetinghouse scheduler to ensure that the expectations for care of the meetinghouse are met, including but not limited to maintenance of the facility for these events.

Ministry and Counsel brought this proposal in order to expand on Meeting's existing guidelines for use of the building by Moses Brown to include weddings and funerals. Meeting's existing guidelines include a range of suggested contributions for this type of use. Friends approved this proposal.

9. Saylesville: Joanne Griffin reported that Property Committee and Saylesville Preparative meeting have been discussing further work needed for completion of the east wall of the meetinghouse. The "Stage II" work authorized by the meeting should be completed this summer. The business meeting will then need to approve Stage III, which is the interior finish work, before seeking outside funding. The previous estimate for Stage III was \$27,000, which was a contractor's estimate and our experience is that we are doing the work more economically. However, the working group has a list of other items it would like to add to this list, which should be done while the walls are open. The funds already available in the Saylesville maintenance reserve are about \$16,000, minus what remains to be spent for Stage II work. In accordance with the meeting's policy on grants, the preparative meeting is asking for authorization to apply for grant funding for the remaining work.

We are committed to finishing the planned work on the east wall, including what was originally designated as "Stage III," estimated to cost no more than \$35,000. We approve applications for grant funding for this purpose, using the existing Saylesville maintenance fund as matching funds if needed. Use of any meeting funds beyond the maintenance reserve would require additional business meeting approval.

10. Treasurer's Report: Peter Swaszek presented a report on the fiscal year ending 5th mo. 31, 2011. We ended the year with an operating deficit of \$112.33, which the Finance Committee feels is an excellent result. The Treasurer noted that there is still more than \$4,000 remaining in the David Smith fund; the projection equipment that was approved has not yet been purchased. He also noted that there is almost \$128,000 in a fund restricted by donors for an addition to the Providence meetinghouse, with no current plan to spend it. 11. Property Committee: Betsy Zimmerman reported on the progress of negotiations with Moses Brown School concerning the landscaping connected with the head of school's house, which has involved several knowledgeable members of the meeting. The drainage for the house will be on the school's property, as we had requested. Most of the trees in the affected area are chokecherries, which propagate easily but are short-lived. An arborist has suggested thinning out the chokecherries as well as some of the larger trees with dying sections, to encourage better growth of preferred varieties. Moses Brown's crew will be doing this work within the next few weeks. We may want to plant some additional trees and shrubs, and do some additional thinning, over the next few years. Friends would like to retain the wood for sale or use, if possible.

There has also been consensus that the de facto pathway contributes to water runoff and should be eliminated if possible. The planned sidewalk and curbing should help reduce water runoff in this area.

We appreciate those who have put considerable time into this matter.

12. We closed at 2:27, purposing to meet again in the fall or at the call of the clerk.

Quakers from across New England will gather at Bryant University in Smithfield, RI for our 2011 Annual Sessions, August 6–11. Additionally, there will be a celebration of NEYM's 350th birthday on Friday afternoon, August 5 at the Great Meetinghouse in Newport, RI, the home to early New England Friends' Yearly Meeting Sessions. The theme of this year's Sessions is <u>350 Years of New England Friends: Called to Heal a Broken Earth.</u>

Friday's Events

On Friday August 5, starting 1pm, join Friends/friends from all over New England when the Great Meeting House in Newport will open its doors once again during New England Yearly Meeting's Annual Sessions. The Great Friends Meeting House was built in 1699, is the oldest surviving house of worship in Rhode Island, served as host to New England Friends Yearly Meeting until 1905 and was, upon its construction, the largest structure of any kind in the colonies between Boston and New York.

The afternoon will begin with a service project at the Martin Luther King Jr. Community Center, adjacent to the Great Meeting House, which has served the neighborhood surrounding the Meeting House for the past fifty years. A brief witness of peace in silent vigil will follow. Then, in late afternoon, we will share a light picnic supper before entering the Meeting House to settle into open worship followed by active worship of song and story. The early-evening program will include a dramatic choral presentation, led by John Sheldon of Warwick Meeting in England, on the life of George Fox and the history of Friends, entitled "The Fire and the Hammer."

The afternoon is planned to be joyful and meaningful for children and adults, Friends and friends alike.
