#### Providence Monthly Meeting for Business Minutes – 11 Third Month 2012

1. The meeting opened at 12:18 PM with sixteen present. The Clerk read the following Queries on Outreach from Faith and Practice of New England Yearly Meeting, 1985:

Do you welcome inquirers and visitors to your meeting? Do you encourage their continued attendance and participation? Are you patterns, examples; do your lives preach among all sorts of people, and to them? Do you walk cheerfully over the world, answering that of God in every one?

#### 2. Announcements:

The NEYM Mid-Year Gathering will be on Saturday, March 31, 8:30 AM to 8:00 PM, organized by Sessions Committee and the Young Adult Friends Climate Change Working Group, at St Andrews Episcopal Church in Wellesley, Massachusetts. Check <u>neym.org/midyear</u> for online registration. There will be a \$25 charge per adult. No charge for children. Overnight hospitality with area Friends will be available upon request.

Jeremiah Dickinson, Clerk of the Board of Trustees of The Meeting School, a co-educational Quaker school in Rindge, NH, wrote to tell us that the school will not transition to a semester school. Rather, the Board has decided that selling the property is the most prudent course of action at this time.

3. Friends approved the transfer of membership of Michael Hirtle from Storrs Friends Meeting.

4. At our last Meeting for Business we heard the draft of our State of the Society report, which focused on our Providence worship site. A few changes have been made; these were read aloud. Friends approved the revised version.

5. Saylesville's Meeting for Business has prepared and approved a State of the Society report, which was reviewed. Friends approved sending both State of the Society reports to Quarterly Meeting and approved having Joanne Griffin, Clerk at Saylesville, read the Saylesville report at Quarterly Meeting.

6. For Ministry and Counsel, Debbie Block reported that the committee is continuing to work on a proposal that Meeting be listed by the Institute of Welcoming Resources as a religious organization that is welcoming to the gay-lesbian-bisexual-transgender (GLBT) community.

7. For Finance Committee, the Presiding Clerk relayed that Finance Committee will be proposing a \$7085 increase in expenditures, which will require a similar increase in contributions.

8. There was no treasurer's report this month.

9. For Saylesville, Joanne Griffin, Clerk at Saylesville, reported that in the summer, on the third Saturday of June, July, and August, there will be a treasure hunt co-sponsored by Saylesville Preparative Meeting and Arnold House. This will coincide with the ongoing book swap. Also, the Wednesday worship group at Saylesville has been meeting and has been well-attended.

The meeting closed with a period of grateful silence at 12:50 PM.

#### The Meeting School (NH) in Transition

Dear Friend,

I am writing to you as part of an effort to spread the word about The Meeting School situation. It is my hope that someone in your meeting may be in a position to respond.

In February 2011, The Meeting School determined it could not continue as a four-year high school and entered a sabbatical year, planning to reopen with a new educational model. After a year's intensive effort, we are not able to realize this plan. We are now seeking proposals for purchase of the property in Rindge, NH. Our hope and expectation is that one or more individuals with the necessary financial and other resources will arise to continue the mission in a manner that reflects and extends the life and spirit that have been embodied in The Meeting School. We will share work we have done and help in any other way we can.

We ask that you consider the attached Request for Proposals and share it with anyone you feel may have an interest.

The Meeting School was founded in 1957 to "...make available a place where real work, natural play and rigorous intellectual striving after truth are joined together in developing the life of the Spirit," where "the Quaker testimonies of simplicity, peace and service are emphasized." For over 50 years the School lived into this mission as a four-year high school, providing quality education and an opportunity to live and work on an historic New England farm, transforming lives through the small community experience based on the principles and practices of the Religious Society of Friends.

In early 2011, responding to changes in the educational world, the Board of Trustees announced a sabbatical for the School and embarked on a process of discernment to listen for way forward. Consulting with the extended School community and with other Quaker schools, the Board of Trustees sought a new model for education at The Meeting School. In a year of active effort, we were not able to secure the necessary funds or partners to bring this to fruition. The Board is now seeking additional proposals.

Our first priority is to sell the property for any purpose or purposes that reflect and extend the life and spirit that have been embodied in The Meeting School. In addition, priority will be given to proposals for the whole property, and to those that commit to sustainable stewardship of the land.

We will share work we have done and help in any other way we can. Our desire is that this place, which for over 50 years has been the home of a transformative Quaker community, continue serving as a beacon of Light to the world.

TED is a nonprofit devoted to <u>Ideas Worth Spreading</u> which started out in 1984 in conference form. Its original participants came from the worlds of Technology, Entertainment and Design, and talks given at its 2 yearly conferences are available (as videos) to all people on the TED's internet site.

TEDx conferences are a spin off; they are held all over the world – featuring creative thinkers who present speeches of 18 minutes or less that encapsulate *Ideas Worth Spreading*. Moses Brown's TEDx conference is the brainchild of a member of our Meeting, Austin Jaspers, who researched the possibility of holding a TEDx conference during his senior project last year.

Moses Brown adopted his proposal, Matt Glendinning organized a TEDx Steering Committee and the project got underway. The title of MB's TEDx conference is "Lives That Speak" - referencing George Fox's invitation to live boldly and with a sense of purpose. Several of the speakers are Quakers.
