In the opening worship, assistant clerk Dan Lederer, serving as presiding clerk for the day, read an advice from New England Yearly Meeting's 1985 Faith and Practice:

In meetings for business, and in all duties connected with them, seek again the leadings of the Light; let our utterances be brief and without repetition. Let us keep from obstinacy and from harshness of tone or manner and admit the possibility of being in error. In all the affairs of the meeting community, let us proceed in a peaceable spirit, with forbearance and warm affection for each other.

2. Announcements:

The 2012 Friends General Conference Gathering of Friends will take place from Sunday July 1 to Saturday July 7 at URI (South Kingstown). Even if you are not registered, various events are free and open to the public: Sunday's Opening Worship, evening programs on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday, the Gathering Store, exhibits, and the visual arts gallery. Opportunities still exist for those interested in volunteering; contact Mark Conley for more information.

New England Yearly Meeting sessions will take place at Bryant University in Smithfield, August 4-9. Registration is now open online at www.neym.org. Families with children and those who would like financial assistance through the Equalization Fund need to register by June 30. Extra copies of the New England Friend with full information and registration form are available at the Providence meetinghouse.

Rhode Island Smithfield Quarterly Meeting will be held at Worcester meetinghouse on the 15th of 7th month, 2012, at noon. All are welcome.

3. For Ministry and Counsel, Bruce Downing presented a memorial minute for our Friend Ruth Virgadamo. The minute was approved, to be forwarded to Rhode Island-Smithfield Quarterly Meeting. (A copy is attached to the record copy of these minutes.)

4. Building Use Committee Proposal: Bruce Carlsten reported on the committee's progress on the matters requested by a previous meeting for business. The committee has drafted many of the needed documents, but because they are interrelated, does not want to present a partial report. We accept this interim report and extend the time for the committee's final report until the meeting for business in 12th month 2012.

5. Quaker Quest: Betsy Zimmerman reported that the committee set this project aside for this year because of the work required to prepare for the upcoming Friends General Conference Gathering. The Adult Education committee hopes to proceed with it in the fall. We note that there may be opportunities at the FGC Gathering to consult further with people experienced with Quaker Quest. We ask the Adult Education committee to bring a specific proposal for our consideration as early in the fall as feasible.

6. Treasurer's Report: Peter Swaszek presented a report (unaudited) for the year ending 31st of 5th month 2012. We finished the year with a surplus of just under \$4,000, which has been transferred to the general fund reserves. Contributions from members and attenders were up about ten percent over the previous year. The most significant items paid during the past month were new shelving in the library, and a copper beech tree planted in memory of Katherine Perry. The New England Friends Home mortgage has been paid off when the Home was sold. We accept this report.

7. For Saylesville Preparative Meeting, Joanne Griffin reported that the meeting was asked if several craftspeople could set up sales booths in the yard during the monthly book swap, and agreed to try it. Each paid \$20. The meeting also sold hot dogs and other items. The proceeds of about \$285 are going into the General Fund. The meeting plans to repeat this experiment on the 22d of 9th month, has additional crafters lined up, and would welcome additional sellers. The town has confirmed that religious groups are allowed to conduct this type of activity twice per year

without any special permit.

The meeting has also consulted with the Lincoln Fire Department to determine the appropriate capacity for this building, and is awaiting confirmation of the figure. This will be helpful in formulating building use guidelines.

8. No further business appearing, we closed at 12:45 with a period of grateful silence, intending to meet again (God willing) on the 9th of 9th month, 2012, at the Saylesville meetinghouse, or at the earlier call of the clerk.

MEMORIAL MINUTE FOR RUTH VIRGADAMO

Ruth (Ploettner) Virgadamo, a beloved member of Providence Meeting, passed away peacefully July 6, 2011. Born on May 13, 1942, she first came to Friends in 1981 with her family in tow. She is the mother of Sarah Bryan and Paul Virgadamo, Jr. and grandmother of Russell and Phillip Bryan and Sophia and Liam Virgadamo. A person with a strong social conscience, even before she came to Friends, she became very active, demonstrating those beliefs within the Meeting and the community in areas that included universal equality, reading to youth, and becoming an advocate for senior citizens.

A nurse by profession, she was educated at Deaconess Hospital, Boston, Massachusetts, something that she was very proud of throughout her life. Her career included working at the Boston Children's Medical Center in the Cardiac and Neuro-Intensive Care Unit, being head nurse at Boston's Lahey Clinic's Neurosurgical Unit, and as a private duty nurse at the Jane Brown Unit at Rhode Island Hospital in Providence, Rhode Island. Once Sarah and Paul were born she worked many summers as camp nurse at various summer camps.

From as early as she could remember she felt destined to be a nurse, telling of being a very young child walking with her grandmother and making her stop so that Ruth could look at each baby in each carriage they passed. Throughout her life if any person or animal she knew was sick, everything else was put aside and her energies were focused on making them comfortable and well again.

In her personal life passions for gardening, camping and small boat were second only to her devotion to Sarah and Paul. Ruth's intense love for all children could be seen by her caring of the infants and young children in the meetinghouse nursery for many years. A gifted singer, she enjoyed singing throughout her life, be it for her children, others or her own enjoyment. She loved music from the musicals of the 1930's, music that was perfect for the special delicate trill in her trained voice.

Giving was the hallmark of Ruth's life; she said it rejuvenated her spirit and she will be greatly missed by her children, family, friends and Providence Monthly Meeting.

AFSC-SENE REPORT AND THANKS FROM MARTHA YEAGER

Greetings Everyone


By now I hope you have heard the good news about the passage of the Homeless Bill of Rights by the RI legislature, making RI the first state in the country to pass such protections. I want to thank you for your part in this, for phone calls made and for help with the State House Soup Kitchen, which brought people who don't have enough to eat (many of whom are homeless) together with legislators on a weekly basis. It was an ambitious project to produce bag lunches for 100 people each week, transport them to the state house and serve then. It was groups like Providence Meeting who stepped forward to host a week that made it possible. Thank you.

Several other important pieces of the housing coalition legislation that don't require any money from the state lost out to the corporations who resisted - Just Cause Eviction (which would have protected renters whose landlords get foreclosed, opposed by the banks) and payday lending (limiting interest payday lenders can charge, opposed of course by payday lenders). We will have to try again next year.

Also losing were Ban the Box (prohibiting the initial application for a job from asking if the applicant has ever been convicted of anything) and the bill to limit racial profiling. Again, more work next year.

A PUBLIC BANK FOR RHODE ISLAND from Bruce Carlsten (repeated by request)

The State of Rhode Island presently gives all its banking business to a major commercial bank such as the Bank of America. The profit that this bank gains from RI money such as your income tax deposits, bond issues, etc. then is used for the bank's business ventures elsewhere in the U.S. and internationally.

North Dakota (and I believe some other states) have a better idea. They have established a public bank which handles all their banking business. The independently run bank, being a member of their community acts as such. The money stays in the state and it provides loans (small business, personal, mortgage, etc.) to its citizens/neighbors. Private citizens can also deposit their money in this bank knowing that the profits will be used to benefit them.

North Dakota has had a public bank for many years and it has proven very successful and a model for other states. Tom Sgouros, who has testified on several occasions at the RI State House, has often touted this as an action that would be good for Rhode Island.

I would like to know if, sometime in the near future, individuals would be willing to listen to a short 30 minute power point presentation on public banking followed by a question and answer session. Please contact Bruce Carlsten if this interests you.


