Providence Monthly Meeting for Business Minutes – 10 Third Month, 2013

We gathered at 12:15 p.m. at the Providence meetinghouse, with 22 in attendance. In the opening worship, the clerk read the following queries from *NEYM Faith and Practice* (given preliminary approval 2012):

- Do you maintain an appropriate balance among work, service, worship, family, and recreation?
- Are you ready to rest if God asks it of you?

1. Announcements:

The NEYM Permanent Board will be meeting from 9:00 AM to 3:30 PM on Saturday March 16 at the Smithfield Meetinghouse. Anyone interested is invited to attend.

The 2013 NEYM Midyear Gathering "Let the Living Water Flow! Friends Serving God's Purposes," will be Saturday, March 23, 8:30 AM to 6:30 PM. at Portland Friends Meeting in Portland, Maine.

There will be a memorial service for Grace Lamb at the Providence Meetinghouse on Saturday, April 13, starting at 2:00 PM.

On March 17 at noon there will be a music program "Green Songs" at Saylesville Meeting House.

2. For Ministry and Counsel, David Bourns presented the Providence State of the Society report (see addendum to these minutes). This report and the report heard last Business Meeting from Saylesville Meeting will both be forwarded to Quarterly Meeting and then on to Yearly Meeting. Meeting received this report gratefully.

3. Anne DiMase, Membership Recorder, reported that she and Elsie Morse worked together to compile the Statistical Report this year. Our combined membership from Saylesville, Providence, and Conanicut Meetings last year was 213 and it has increased to 220 this year due to six additions by applications and three from transfers from other Friends Meetings, and was reduced by two because there was one loss by death and one by resignation. So we have had a net total gain of seven. Our membership is comprised of 109 males and 111 females, with 170 resident and 50 non-resident members. There are 12 age 14 and younger, 10 age 15 through 18, 23 age 19 through 25, and 70 age 65 and over. One Junior Member became an Adult Member. Average attendance at Sunday Meeting for Worship is 83 (counting all three worships sites) and average attendance at Weekday Meeting for Worship is 7. On average 5 attend First Day School (age 18 and younger). Average attendance at Meeting for Business is 19. The average number of Active Attenders (non-members) is 34.

4. For Ministry and Counsel, David Bourns reported that Jordan Taylor has met with Ministry and Counsel and requested to make an audio recording of Meeting for Worship as part of his art project at Rhode Island School for Design. A special Clearness Committee has already met with him to explore this matter and a threshing session will take place at 12 noon after Meeting for Worship and potluck on First Day April 7 to consider Jordan's proposal further and collect broader input from members.

5. David Bourns also reported that we will try a different approach to scheduling Meeting for Business by eliminating the evening sessions that we have been having twice a year. Meeting for Business will be on the second Sunday of each month from now on starting at noon. It will be at Providence from November through April inclusive and will be at Saylesville in May, June, September, and October. As usual, no Meeting for Business will be held in July and August.

6. Bill Monroe reported for Finance Committee that they are working on next year's Budget and he hopes that a draft will be ready for next month's Meeting for Business. NEYM has reported that the Hingham Friends Home has been sold and there has been a Legacy Committee appointed to receive and collect input and proposals from monthly meetings (not individuals) for guidance on the future of the proceeds from this sale. Bill will send information via the email list providing background on this matter. It was decided that we will have a Worship Sharing specially called at 11:45 AM on March 17 to consider this matter, and it is hoped that members of NEYM Permanent Board will be in attendance.

7. Treasurer Peter Swaszek presented the treasurer's report through February 28. He requested that he be allowed to increase spending for nursery care at Providence by \$300 and for electricity at Saylesville by \$150 because those two lines have gone above the budgeted amounts. Friends approved.

No further business appearing, we closed with worship at 1:45 PM, intending to meet again, God willing, at noon on the 14th of 4th month.

State of The Society Report 2012

Providence Monthly Meeting

Providence Monthly Meeting is blessed with three meeting houses, each of which tends to have its own group of worshippers. This report focuses on that group which considers the Providence Meeting House its home meeting house.

The Providence Meeting continues to thrive. We added 6 new members. New families find a home here and new children make joyful noises from the nursery. Older children leave to go downstairs after 15 minutes of sitting with their parents or grandparents and arrive again at the rise of meeting with important announcements and often a craft project or picture to emphasize that announcement. Many of our high school students leave the area to attend college. Some students who have moved to this area to attend local colleges come in to check us out, often expressing thankfulness in finding in this meeting some of the comfort afforded by their home or previous school meetings. Others just decide to come despite having no previous Quaker connection.

We held a memorial service for John Kellam, a member who had worshipped at the Providence Meeting since 1950. We were involved with Friends far and near including those who traveled to Rhode Island for the Friends General Conference and those who traveled from this meeting to attend other meetings and conferences ranging from local to global. The meeting house continues to be the home for a Music for Children program, a shape-note singing group, and a winter-time CSA (Community Supported Agriculture).

This year our traditional worship sharing on the state of the society was replaced with a modified potluck after meeting for worship. Five tables were set aside, each with a facilitator, for those interested in wrestling with queries concerning the state of our society. Responses to these queries at the potluck, from emails, and from direct discussion are the basis for this report.

1. How would you describe the Quality of our worship? In what ways were your spiritual needs being met or not met in our worship? The quality of our worship was, in general, thought to be good, and spiritual needs were being met. The fact that many different people were contributing spoken messages, and that meetings for worship ran the gamut from being totally silent to having many messages was seen as evidence of this. The After-Thoughts tables were cited repeatedly as a useful way to continue discussion of messages after meeting, and as useful places for those "who find mingling difficult". Concerns were expressed over insufficient time after a message to fully absorb it, and it was suggested that guidelines on speaking in meeting might be helpful, as might be a Quakerism 101 class.

2. How has our meeting for worship reached out to the wider community? What have we been doing to invite new attenders and encourage continued participation? While Marriage Equality participation, Camp Street Ministries, and AFSC were cited as examples of outreach there was a recurring theme that we could and should do more, be it pursuing Quaker Quest, becoming more involved in social justice issues or enhancing our online presence. New attenders seem to come either by word-of-mouth, as a desire to reconnect after some prior Quaker experience (school or family), or as curious seekers. Those newer attenders who were at the potluck felt appropriately welcomed.

3. How are we attending to the needs of our own community? First Day School, the young adults group, game night, the Pastoral Care Committee's work and the After-Thoughts discussion group were all cited as examples of how we attend to the needs of our own community. It was suggested that a phone tree-like mechanism would be useful in the event that all who attend meeting needed to be contacted rapidly.

4. How have we deepened our connection to the testimonies that guide our faith? Peace and Social Witness? Environmental stewardship? Simplicity? Equality? Integrity? Stewardship of resources? With regard to the testimonies there was concern that the Peace and Social Concerns committee was inactive. We, as individuals and families, are guided by these testimonies and perhaps it follows that therefore the meeting is as well. There was little feedback from the potluck as to how we as a meeting are guided by them. We compost, we drive fuel-efficient cars, we wear sweaters, is that enough?

5. In what ways does our meeting recognize, develop, and nurture the gifts of our members and attenders of all ages? First Day School was cited as an area where we feel we are doing well. The children's announcements at the rise of meeting are a highlight for many. The nominating committee is doing a good job

CLERK'S CORNER by Dan Lederer

How We Communicate

"Dear Friends, watch over one another in love, and stir up that which is pure in one another, and exhort one another daily." George Fox, Epistle 22

From the first days of the Society of Friends in the 17th century, Quakers communicated with one another via the written word. George Fox disseminated his epistles far and wide, both in Europe and in America, explaining and espousing his views. Of course, that was all the current technology offered at the time; Samuel Morse didn't patent his telegraph until 1837, and it wasn't until 1876 that Alexander Graham Bell patented his marvelous invention. Now we find ourselves in the midst of a cyber-revolution, with such modalities as email, texting, and tweeting available to all. While we may view the rapidly evolving technology with awe, the concern as to whether perhaps there's something un-Quakerly about all this may also arise.

How do we make use of new technology at Providence Monthly Meeting? Our newsletter, The Provident Friend, has been in existence in one form or another for many years, but whereas initially it was mailed to Friends, we now encourage readers to receive it electronically. Certainly we've embraced email as a valid way to reach out to each other. Meeting's email list, which keeps Friends informed about current issues and events, functions as our electronic bulletin board. And Meeting's website maintains a calendar of important dates in the life of our meeting as well as such features as a description of our three worship sites, copies of recent and past newsletters, information about our various programs, and much more.

But we want to be cautious about allowing any of these forms of communication to displace our time-honored tradition of face-to-face discourse. This issue came up at Ministry and Counsel awhile back, and the sense of the committee was that email could be useful for providing information to the group, but we should defer decision-making until we could meet together. Why so? Because we have faith in the ability of our process of corporate discernment to find the optimal course for our Meeting community, and our experience has been that this is best accomplished by sitting quietly together in the context of worship and hearing each other's leadings. My hope is that we can continue to honor this valuable practice while simultaneously taking advantage of the many means of communication that enhance our connectedness.

Music, whether around the piano, around the old singing tree, or by offering the use of the meeting house for shape note and other singing groups has also been a way to involve many ages in a communal endeavor, and expose non Quakers to our community, if only tangentially.

6. How did meeting for business play a part in your Meeting life in 2012?

The low attendance at Meeting for worship with a concern for business (which averaged about 14) is a cause for concern. Comments from the potluck stated it was held at a difficult time and day especially for those with families, that it was too long of a day, that there was a "poor connection between business and spiritual", and that there was confusion as to where it would be held and what was on the agenda.

All in all, this has been a year filled with blessings and challenges. We are grateful for our community, the people, activities, and worship that bind us together, and we are ready for and look forward to the blessings and the challenges that this new year will bring.
