Saylesville – Christmas Eve Candlelight Service

The very beautiful annual Christmas Eve Candlelight Service, a meeting for worship, will be held at the Saylesville Meetinghouse at 4:30 PM on Tuesday, December 24. We encourage that you bring candles and candle holders, and finger-foods to share afterward. All are welcome.

Worship Sharing - Sunday Nov 17 noon

There will be a Worship Sharing at the Providence Meetinghouse at noon on Sunday, November 17. Over recent months everyone at Meeting has become aware that, around 60 years ago, child sexual abuse occurred within one of the families in our Meeting community. Ministry and Counsel has spent the better part of this last year reflecting on what might have happened, how this should be made known to everyone, how we can acknowledge the damage and pain that remains, and how we can make our Meeting a safe and supportive community. As you already know, we have provided information to Friends about the mandatory reporting of suspected child abuse that is required in Rhode Island, and we have reviewed and modified our Meeting Handbook to include this information.

Beyond this, we believe that it would serve us well to come together to reflect on our Meeting Community and how we can make it a safe place for all of us and for all of our families. So our Worship Sharing will explore the following queries: What more can we, as individuals and as a Meeting, do to ensure a supportive and safe community for both children and adults? What does Living in the Truth mean for us as Friends?

Providence Monthly Meeting for Worship with a Concern for Business Minutes – 10th Eleventh Month, 2013

1. We gathered at 12:05 pm at the Providence meetinghouse, with 25 present. In the opening worship the clerk read the following advice, from the NEYM Faith & Practice (preliminary approval 2012):

No one human being or group has the full measure of the Light. Seek to understand the experience of those whose theology and practices differ from your own. Take opportunities to enter into prayer and work with the wider community of faith. Find ways to articulate your own faith so that it may be shared with others.

2. Announcements:

- There will be a Worship Sharing at noon on 11th mo. 17 at the Providence Meetinghouse. The queries to be explored will be: What more can we, as individuals and as a Meeting, do to ensure a supportive and safe community for both children and adults? What does Living in the Truth mean for us as Friends?

- If there is enough interest, there will be a Thanksgiving Day dinner (11th mo. 28) at the Providence Meetinghouse. Contact Betsy Cazden if you would like to participate.

- The Meeting Christmas Gathering will be on 12th mo. 14 at 5:00 pm, followed by a potluck meal. Contact John Lord if you would like to perform.

- Saylesville will host its usual candlelight worship at 4:30 pm on 12th mo. 24, followed by light refreshments.

3. Membership transfer: Richard Ristow has requested transfer of his membership to the Friends Meeting at Cambridge (MA). We approve this transfer with regret and with gratitude for Richard's long service to and participation in this meeting.

4. Other membership matters: Recorder Anne DiMase reported that our member Robert Jenkins is deceased (2012). Darrin Gomes has found another religious home outside the area and his membership should be discontinued. We approve this discontinuance.

5. Peace and Social Concerns: Mark Conley, new clerk of the committee, reported that the committee has resumed regular meetings. They see Peace & Social Concerns as a spiritual practice, discerning what things the committee and the meeting can and should be doing,

The committee has been working with the Religious Education Committee on a program to help high school and Young Adult Friends discern their response to the ongoing requirement for men to register for Selective Service (draft), including helping them develop conscientious objection files. The committee has begun discussion with Moses Brown School about doing outreach on this issue, which affects young people's eligibility for college financial aid.

The committee is also seeking clarity on what it may be called to do on sustainability, gun control, and stewardship of financial resources and investments.

Mark noted that the committee sees its role as "making the meeting uncomfortable," and looks forward to working with all of us.

Phebe Howland, Barbara Zimmer, and Michael Hirtle have agreed to serve on the committee. We approve. Mike Hirtle has agreed to serve as liaison between the P&SC Committee and the Finance Committee.

6. Saylesville: Joanne Griffin reported that the preparative meeting will be hosting a community music program on the 17th of this month; they regret the conflict with the worship-sharing, but had already sent publicity out so are unable to change the date or time. There is a problem with the heating system, which they are working with Property Committee to resolve. Saylesville invites Friends to assist with bagging up leaves, to save paying someone to haul them away.

7. The meeting closed with worship at 12:45 pm, intending to meet next on the 8th of 12th month, at the Providence meetinghouse, God willing.

Items of Interest From the Finance Committee - from Bill Monroe

The Finance Committee would like to know whether members and attenders would be interested in making automatic donations to the Meeting from their bank accounts (or credit cards). Some members currently do this by having checks sent from their bank accounts on a regular schedule (monthly or quarterly). This could also be done electronically, although the Meeting may need to pay a fee to receive such payments. If there is enough interest, however, it may be worthwhile to set up something like this. We are also looking into changing some of our investments, and thought this might provide a good occasion for a wider discussion of socially responsible investing. We would like to hold such a discussion after meeting for worship sometime in December and want to extend an invitation to any members or attenders who are interested. Whether you already have investments and would like to share your experience, or are interested in making some investments and would like to benefit from others' expertise, please come. We will announce the date soon.

Restricted Donations, Revisited by Dan Lederer

I'm writing once again in regard to Meeting's contribution to Friends United Meeting (FUM). This is the season of the year when many of us are thinking about making charitable donations. As always, Providence Monthly Meeting welcomes donations, since they represent a major source of income for our various activities.

Under normal circumstances, donations to PMM go into the general fund and are distributed proportionally among our expenses. However, in 2010 Meeting for Business approved a minute allowing contributors, if they so wish, to specify that they would prefer that no part of their donation go to Friends United Meeting. Please note that this restriction applies only to FUM and not to any of the other non-profit organizations to which we contribute. At Sessions this summer, NEYM approved allowing its constituent meetings to continue this arrangement for another year. (We do not contribute directly to FUM; our contribution is made through NEYM).

If you choose to restrict your donation in this way, we are asking that you communicate this to our treasurer, Peter Swaszek, by means of a note accompanying your check or even with just a notation on your check saying "Not to FUM". This same restriction can be applied retroactively to donations you made earlier during this fiscal year (June 1, 2013 through May 31, 2014), again just as long as you notify Peter in writing that this is your preference. Peter will take that portion of your donation which would have gone to FUM, 0.58%, and place it in a fund designated for charitable use in the future. The total amount that we send to FUM (as a portion of our contribution to NEYM) will be reduced by that amount, and NEYM will reduce their contribution to FUM by that same amount. There will be no reduction in the financial support that NEYM receives from us for its own use; the reduction will be only in the amount they would have sent to FUM.

Because Peter needs to complete his payments according to our approved budget before the end of our fiscal year, we are asking that Friends who wish to exercise this option make their donations before April 15, 2014. Conversely, anyone who feels moved to make a direct contribution to FUM is encouraged to do so. Their address is Friends United Meeting, 101 Quaker Hill Drive, Richmond, IN 47374. Friends are called, as followers of Christ, to help establish the Kingdom of God on earth. Let us strengthen a sense of kinship with everyone. Let that sense of kinship inspire us in our efforts to build a social order free of violence and oppression, in which no person's development is thwarted by poverty and the lack of health care, education or freedom. Friends are advised to minister to those in need but also to seek to know the facts and the causes of social and economic ills and to work for the removal of those ills. Let us cherish every human being and encourage efforts to overcome all forms of prejudice. - NEYM 1985 Faith and Practice, pg. 209

As the newly appointed clerk of Peace and Social Concerns, the committee has asked me to write an article as often as possible for our newsletter. I am especially pleased that they requested that each of these articles begin with a quote from our yearly meeting's Faith and Practice, or from another yearly's as the Spirit moves.

This month I open with the quote we shared in our opening committee worship for the year. As you will read in the minutes for Meeting for Business, we have been concerned for the increasing militarization and violence in our society. We have committed to helping our youth develop their conscientious objection files as they see fit. In that process, we have discovered that many of us in Meeting are woefully uninformed regarding the laws governing Selective Service. We hope to educate all Friends as to these laws and their consequences for our high-school aged and young adult friends, particularly our young men, whose eligibility for federal financial aid is contingent upon their registration.

We are also working on issues of finance and personal responsibility. In what ways do our uses of our fiscal resources speak to our testimonies? Do we have the knowledge we need to manage our money in a way consistent with our beliefs?

Our last expressed concern revolved around matters concerning gun control. The leading to consider this in our committee was clearly expressed, though we have not yet considered in what ways we will bring this issue forward in the coming months.

We are painfully aware that any list of concerns will leave out crucial matters of peace and justice. We rely on divine guidance to discern what we can do corporately in committee and what we can bring forward to the wider Meeting community as we continue our work. Friends and attenders are always welcome to approach us and share their concerns, ideas, prayers and yes – even frustrations. There is much to do to alleviate suffering in the world. What is given us as our portion to do, even as we value and honor the work of others who go where we cannot? We hope to bring items forward that will give the Meeting reason to consider our testimonies and our witness to them. In the meantime, we ask that you hold us in the Light as we continue our work of discernment in the coming months.
