# Providence Monthly Meeting for Worship with a Concern for Business Minutes – 8th Twelfth Month, 2013

1. We gathered at about 12:05 pm at the Providence meetinghouse with 22 present. Before the opening worship, the clerk reminded the meeting that we conduct our business in a spirit of worship throughout the meeting, not merely in the opening silence. He asked all Friends to help us hold the worship by waiting to be recognized before speaking, and by refraining from reacting (verbally or nonverbally) to what is said. He then read the following Advices from NEYM Faith and Practice (draft given preliminary approval, 2012):

Attend to the Spirit at work in the ordinary activities and experiences of your daily life.

There is inspiration to be found all around us, in the natural world, in the sciences and arts, in our work and friendships, in our sorrows as well as in our joys. Be open to and alert for how the Spirit may be speaking to you in fresh ways, leading you in new directions.

#### 2. Announcements:

- The meeting's Christmas Gathering will be at 5:00 pm on the 14<sup>th</sup> of this month at the Providence meetinghouse, followed by a potluck meal. Contact John Lord if you would like to perform.
- There will be a "Music at the Meetinghouse" on the 15<sup>th</sup> of this month from 12:00 to 2:00 pm at the Saylesville meetinghouse. All are warmly welcomed.
- Saylesville welcomes all to candlelight worship on the 24<sup>th</sup> of this month at 4:30 pm.
- 3. Membership: On behalf of Ministry and Counsel, Joanne Griffin brought forward a recommendation, following the usual clearness process, that Liberty Goodwin be accepted into membership in the meeting. We approve. Saylesville Friends will plan a welcoming event.
- 4. Use of the meetinghouse: Nina Berry reported that the Program Committee has been examining our policies for use of our meetinghouses. The committee wants to ensure that the arrangements we make protect both the meeting and all those who use the buildings. A number of questions have arisen on which they would like legal review. The committee requests authorization to hire legal counsel to answer these questions and advise the meeting, up to \$1,500. This would be an addition to the committee's budget and to the budget as a whole. The Treasurer and other members of the Finance Committee are easy with this proposal. We approve this recommendation, with a cap of \$1,500. We leave it to the Treasurer and the Finance Committee to determine how this should be reported in the meeting's records.
- 5. Finance: Bill Monroe reported that the committee organized a lively discussion of socially responsible investing last week after meeting for worship, and the committee looks forward to continuing that conversation.
- 6. Treasurer: Peter Swaszek presented an interim report on the meeting's finances through the first half of the fiscal year. He noted that an appeal letter went out in mid-November to all households. He noted that income for fundraising events and use of the meetinghouse is running way ahead of budget. Expenses are about as expected.
- 7. Saylesville: Joanne Griffin reported that there is urgent attention being given to a problem with the heating system.
- 8. No further business appearing, we closed with worship, expecting to meet again on the 12th of 1st month, 2014, at the Providence meetinghouse.

# Peace and Social Concerns hosts informal Conscienscious Objection Session and Pizza Party for Young Adult Friends - Jan 5 at noon (snow date Jan 12)

Peace and Social Concerns is inviting you to a pizza party that includes discussion and information for you if you are or will be eligible for the draft, with an aim to help you think about where you stand regarding any potential military service. Young men must register for the draft or face serious penalties, and young women have to consider what might happen if they were faced with this choice as well. You hear a lot from the military point of view, but we wanted to give you some information from another viewpoint.

We have invited some people to come to the party to help talk about things you might want to consider as you think about continuing to build your conscientious objection files. Member Bruce Downing sits on the board that would be activated should the military ever begin the draft again that would call young people up to serve. He will be there to talk to you about what you might want to have in your file in case you wanted to be considered for conscientious objector status or for alternative service. Attender Ket Fox will also be there to speak about his experience with the draft during the days of the Vietnam War and how a Quaker was there to help him think through what he needed to do. Finally, we have asked Ruth Ben-Artzi to join us to provide a woman's perspective. She is from Israel, where women already face this issue. She currently teaches at Providence College; her brother is one of the most famous conscientious objectors in that country, and she speaks and teaches on this topic.

Will you join us? We will have materials there for you in case you want to keep building your file, but there will be no obligation to do anything, other than to think about what you hear. If we have a snowstorm, we would hold the event a week later, to Jan 12<sup>th</sup>.

If you are interested in coming, please Mark Conley (or anyone on Peace and Social Concerns) know, so we are sure we have enough pizza for everyone. You can even let him know what toppings you like - we hope to see you there!

### A Celebration of the Paul Cuffee School

In September 2001, a new charter school opened its doors in Providence with 130 students in K-3. Now commencing its 12th year, that school has 774 students in grades K-12. On June 5, 2014, it will have its first graduation — a joyous ceremony with diplomas, awards, proud parents and teachers, handshakes and hugs.

The phenomenal success of Paul Cuffee School is cause for celebration. In the first year, we rented classrooms at the French American School on John Street and Holy Name School on Camp Street. The only office was in a Sunday school room at Community Church of Providence, a mile or more from the classroom buildings.

A tone of trust pervaded the school and became the cornerstone upon which its supportive culture was built. We trusted ourselves and, in turn, were trusted. Parents trusted us even in August when we were not sure where we would have classes in September. The Department of Education trusted us, as did banks and the philanthropic community. As trustees and faculty, we were convinced we had the skills and energy to create a great school.

Paul Cuffee School is named for a remarkable man of color, half African-American, half Native American, who lived from 1759 to 1817. The son of a freed slave, he was an immensely successful merchant, ship builder and sea captain. By 1800 he may have been the wealthiest man of color in the United States.


He and his Native American wife, Alice, lived in Westport, Mass., where they raised their seven children. Paul offered to pay amply for the construction of a school for the town, but was rebuffed because some citizens did not wish their children to sit with youth of color. He went ahead and built a school, opened it to white children as well as his own, and the less prejudiced townspeople gladly accepted his offer. Arguably, Paul Cuffee opened the first integrated school in America. (cont p 7)

#### **A Celebration of the Paul Cuffee School** (continued from p 6)

The present Paul Cuffee School exists because of the dogged determination of Cyril Burke of Providence, who envisioned a highly academic school with a nautical theme that would extend the horizons of inner-city youth. Dr. Burke applied for the charter, filled out necessary forms, met with education leaders, established a board of trustees and named the school. "Actually, it was my mother's suggestion," he says with a smile.

Paul Cuffee, through his life story, will always be one of the school's most important teachers. Over and over, Cuffee boys and girls are reminded that if Paul could do what he did in his lifetime, facing the prejudices existing then, "surely you can overcome whatever difficulties you encounter today."

The school's success stems from the hard work of many people, but especially from the skills and personality of the first headmaster, David Bourns. He set the tone of trust, of accepting each individual, of convincing each young person of his or her great worth and unique gifts. A good listener, he hired teachers who believed as he did, and were good listeners themselves.

In my 12 years of involvement at Cuffee, I have never heard an adult yell at a student. Michael Obel-Omia, David's successor, maintained the same tone while doing much to bring the high quality of the academic program to public attention. This year, under the leadership of Wendy Randle, the school moves smoothly forward toward that June 5 graduation day. Excitement is in the air.
