Providence Monthly Meeting for Worship with a Concern for Business Minutes – 14 Twelfth Month, 2014

1. We gathered at the Providence meetinghouse at 12:00 pm with ten present. In the absence of the clerk, Assistant Clerk Abigail Mansfield Marcaccio served as clerk for the day. In the opening silence she read the following Queries from NEYM *Faith and Practice* (Interim printing 2012):

Are you ready to respond to any concern God may lay upon you, large or small? What does love require of you?

2. Announcement: Our annual candlelight Christmas Eve service will begin at 4:30 pm on the 24th of this month at the Saylesville meetinghouse.

3. Correspondence received: The NEYM Young Adult Friends Midwinter Retreat with the theme "How do we make peace?" will take place from 7 PM Thursday January 1 through noon Sunday January 4, 2015, at Woolman Hill Retreat Center, Deerfield, MA.

4. Treasurer Peter Swaszek presented an interim report for the second quarter of FY 2015. Individual contributions are running noticeably ahead of the same period last year. Donations for use of the Providence meetinghouse are also higher than budgeted. Expenses are about as budgeted. He noted that the transfer of meeting assets from Pax World Fund to the Friends Fiduciary Green Fund, as approved by the Finance Committee, has been completed (see 9th mo. 2014, minute 4). We accept this report.

5. The clerk invited those present to offer up concerns for consideration at a later meeting. It was reported that the minute approved last month relating to fossil fuels was considered this past week by the NEYM Board of Managers of the Pooled Funds, along with similar expressions from several other meetings and committees, and the Board is working on an amendment to its investment policy consistent with our minute.

It was also reported that a meeting group this morning decided to rehang the "Torture is a Moral Issue" banner on the Providence meetinghouse, as a response to this week's release of the U.S. Senate report on the use of torture by the C.I.A. The banner, which was previously approved by this meeting in 4th mo. 2008, had fallen down in a windstorm, and will be rehung as soon as repairs are made. We approve this action.

No further business appearing, we closed with a period of worship, intending to meet next, God willing, the 11th of 1st mo. 2015.

Ad Hoc Expansion Committee Formed

An Ad Hoc Meetinghouse Expansion Committee was formed to develop a proposal for use of around \$162,000 in a fund that is designated for an addition to the Providence Meetinghouse. At the first meeting on Dec. 21, there was representation from Finance, Property, Program, Religious Education, and Ministry and Counsel.

The committee sent an email later that day, describing possibilities involving a storeroom, a workbench, a bathroom with shower, and an extra classroom for First Day School. An addition with all of that seems feasible using just the money currently in the fund, but additional sources of funding can be explored if necessary.

There will be a worship sharing so that everyone has an opportunity to be heard, but in the meantime the committee is interested in hearing any new ideas you may have. If you have any thoughts, or a different idea about how the money could best serve our Meeting community, please let Dan know so he can bring it to the committee's next meeting. Replies to the email so far have included:

- a designated library space or a second designated meeting space
- a brighter, more inviting spot for the Library.
- large classroom with a small playground, possibly with the goal of a pre-school
- full bathroom with a simple adjacent guest room for one or two overnight guests.
- combination convertible bowling alley/indoor mini-golf

But we really do have lots of good news to share. I'm very excited to report that the ethnic diversity of our patrons is growing. It's wonderful to feel that we are reaching a wider audience, one that reflects our state, because we want to be as inclusive as possible. And we continue to get very positive feedback. It is wonderful just to have the Meetinghouse open. People constantly tell us that they have driven by the place a thousand times and were curious to know more about it; some of them live within walking distance!

We may be a small group but I think we are winning a place in our neighbor's hearts. I often feel that the exchange of books and fellowship is a visible sign that we are abundantly blessed.

Pendle Hill Pamphlet Series, Children's Books, and Question - from the library committee

The Pendle Hill pamphlet series has been published by the Pendle Hill center in Pennsylvania since the 1930s. Each pamphlet is a 36 - page meditation on a single topic of interest to Friends (sample titles: *Children and Solitude, Let Your Lives Speak, Reality of the Spiritual World*), and there is no need to read them in order of publication. Providence Meeting has a fairly complete collection of the (so far) 400+ pamphlets, and they have recently been re-shelved to be more accessible and fitted with borrowing cards. The most recent issues are displayed in the rack at the end of the shelf on the left-hand side of the library, and the remainder are immediately below.

The library committee continues to try to make the library more useful to the meeting community. This week, we relocated the children's books to a low shelf near the door where we hope they will be easier to find. (Some of the Bibles and commentaries have been moved to shelves opposite the door to make room.)

We added a section for our small video collection (some VHS and some DVD). These are now ready for borrowing.

We have a question: do you use the card catalogue? There are boxes of title and author catalogue cards, but we have not been aware of anyone actually using them. We wonder if it is worth the effort to create and file these cards for each new book. Would the meeting approve laying down the card catalogue? We would like help in our discernment. From Communications Committee: Meeting's Email List

Meeting's email list provides information about all Meeting activities as well as various items of interest to Friends. It also delivers our monthly newsletter, The Provident Friend, and, when necessary, communicates last-minute cancellations or postponements. So if you're an engaged participant in Meeting activities, this is an important way to keep informed about what's going on in the life of the Meeting.

You are a 'member of the email list' if we have your email address on it. All 'members of the list' receive all emails sent, and any list member may send emails that will be received by everyone else in the group. To send a message, send it to the email address <u>providence quakers@yahoogroups.com</u>. The email list functions as Meeting's electronic bulletin board, and we ask that certain guidelines be followed. The list's purpose is to inform Friends about upcoming events and other items of interest. It is not an appropriate place for back-and-forth dialogue or for expressing concerns about individuals or committees. As stated in the Meeting Handbook, "No editing is done, so it's left to the individual's judgment to determine that a message will be of interest to Friends."

Links to websites are acceptable in the text of a message, but the list's standard settings do not allow attachments, which we would prefer to avoid unless we can be sure of their origin, an example being something we compose ourselves such as the Meeting newsletter. If an attachment is essential to your message, and you are confident about its origin, you can send your message with attachment to the list moderator at <u>list@providencefriends.org</u>; the moderator can then send your message out with the attachment.

If larger print is easier to read, you can easily change the screen contents and type size. To make it larger, hold the "Ctrl" key and press the "+" sign. To make it smaller, do the same but with the "-" sign. To reset to the original (default) setting, use "Ctrl" with the number "0". For other problems or questions, send an email to <u>list@providencefriends.org</u> or leave a note in the Communications Committee mailbox.

CLERK'S CORNER by Dan Lederer

What Do Quakers Believe?

If you've ever been asked what it is that Quakers believe, you know that it's not an easy question to answer. Arthur Larrabee, former General Secretary of Philadelphia Yearly Meeting, took a stab at it and came up with the following:

"Quakers believe that there is a living, dynamic spiritual presence at work in the world which is both within us and outside of us...that there is that of God in everyone...that each person is capable of the direct and unmediated experience of God...that our understanding and experience of God is nurtured and enlarged in community...that our inward experience of God transforms us and leads us into outward expressions of faithful living, witness and action...that the revelation of God's Truth is continuing and ongoing...that the Bible is an important spiritual resource and the life and teaching of Jesus are relevant for us today...that modeling God's presence in our lives is more important than espousing beliefs."

He expresses lots of ideas here, each worthy of careful consideration. But perhaps what we should explore first is the idea of belief itself. Some would consider religious belief and religious faith to be synonymous, but just for the sake of discussion I would choose to see them as related but different. To me, a belief is something for which one has evidence based on personal experience, acknowledging that such beliefs may be false because our perceptions at times can be mistaken. Faith on the other hand is made up of the assumptions one lives by in the absence of evidence, accepting that we need faith in order to move ahead in life. For example, before undergoing an elective operation I would check out the surgeon's credentials, experience, and reputation, or, in other words, evidence that he or she is competent. But even knowing this, when the time comes to have the operation I will still need to summon faith that the surgeon will be having a good day. The two are related in that my belief leads me to and informs my faith.

Arthur Larrabee points out that Quaker practice offers each of us the opportunity to experience the continuing revelation of spiritual truth. The spiritual search he refers to doesn't necessarily yield immediate results. It requires diligence and patience, and only after one practices for a period of time can belief and faith, as defined above, develop. What first attracted me to Friends was the Quaker premise that we each have the ability to discover truths and thereby develop our own beliefs, without relying on someone else to dictate them to us.

Rather than a recitation of what he thinks we should believe, I expect that the beliefs Arthur Larrabee lists are those he has verified by his own experience as a Quaker. A newcomer to Friends is not required to accept these beliefs, or any others, at face value. Rather, he or she may, over time, find them to be true, or not. That's what, to me, makes the whole process so interesting.

The film explores what drives them and thousands of other like-minded civilians to overcome anger and grief to work for grassroots solutions. It is a film about the everyday leaders in our midst.
