# Providence Monthly Meeting for Worship with a Concern for Business Minutes – 8<sup>th</sup> Eleventh Month, 2015

1. **Opening**. We gathered at the Providence meetinghouse at 11:45 am, with 16 present. In the opening worship, the clerk read the following query from Philadelphia Yearly Meeting Faith and Practice:

Have I experienced in worship that direct leading to listen or to speak, and have I been faithful to my own experience?

- 2. **Announcements**. Friends are invited to bring their voices and instruments and join musician Ken Lyon for a singalong after meeting for worship at Saylesville any First Day.
- 3. **Correspondence**. Next month, from the 11th through the 13th, Woolman Hill and NEYM's Committee on Aging will be co-sponsoring a training program on SAGE (Support Across Generation for Elders). For more information, go to http://www.woolmanhill.org.
- 4. **Religious Education Committee**. Betsy Zimmerman reported on the committee's recent meeting. The committee is seeking a new co-clerk. They are looking for better ways to inform parents what their children are doing in First Day School, so they can reinforce the lessons throughout the week. They hope to encourage each parent to volunteer at least one Sunday per semester as the "second teacher" in the class.

The committee has also discussed the issue of criminal background checks for people working with children. NEYM has offered to coordinate (and pay for) these checks for all monthly meetings. The committee has decided to take up this offer, and will ask people who work regularly with children to go through the background check process. They are also clear that there should always be two adults with the children. We also note that there is now a window in the nursery door for better visibility.

The children have begun work on the Christmas program.

- 5. Adult Religious Education. Zona Douthit reported that the Afterthoughts table continues every non-potluck week, with three people alternating responsibility. It seems to have fostered good discussion. The Quakerism 101 class is up and running, following meeting for worship on six Sundays. It began with 17 people and has stabilized at about 10. Both teachers and participants seem pleased with the program. Rebecca Leuchak has compiled and distributed the advance readings, which are archived for future re-use. At least eight people are already registered for a spring session. The committee hopes to continue running this twice a year, to help both long-time and new attenders to integrate better into the meeting.
- 6. **Finance Committee**. Mike Hirtle reported that the committee is working on the annual appeal letter, and intends to have it ready for mailing next week. He attended a full-day session at Wellesley meetinghouse for Treasurers and Finance Committee clerks around the yearly meeting. He observed that Providence is fortunate in having a reliable and long-serving Treasurer, and that our financial situation seems more stable than in some other meetings.
- 7. **Saylesville**. In response to a question, Joanne Griffin reported that the song-sharing sessions were developed by several musicians in the meeting, using the book Rise Up Singing. It seemed a natural way to use talents that exist within the group. They hope to purchase copies of the new Rise Again songbooks, possibly as part of a larger order for Providence. The session on the fourth Sunday each month is advertised to the public through the community weekly The Valley Breeze.

Joanne reported that the fence in front of the meetinghouse that was damaged by a car some weeks ago is under discussion with Property Committee and with the car's insurance company. It has been suggested that the chainlink fence could be replaced with a different style that would be more aesthetically pleasing and historically appropriate.

The preparative meeting has had a separate website, independent of the Providence monthly meeting website, that was started with the intention of making it easier for members of the preparative meeting to communicate with each other. They plan to integrate it into the monthly meeting site.

There have been some new attenders recently, who came early this morning for breakfast and business meeting.

The heating system is once again not functioning, and Property Committee is looking into it.

The meeting is in conversation with Historic New England on historic programming for 2016.

- 8. Opportunity to raise concerns. No other business appearing, the clerk invited those present to raise concerns for future consideration. Paul Klinkman noted that he hopes to apply to the new NEYM "Legacy Fund" for a grant to support his work on inventions that address climate change. The eligibility criteria approved by NEYM at the 2015 session envision grants to "individual members of NEYM monthly meetings under the direct care and oversight" of a yearly meeting committee or a monthly meeting. The clerk reported that he has already asked the Peace and Social Concerns Committee to consider this proposal and make a recommendation to business meeting.
- 9. Adjournment. We adjourned about 1:00 pm, intending to meet next on the 13th of 12th month at 11:45 am at the Providence meetinghouse.

Gary Sandman of Roanoke Meeting in Roanoke, Virginia, is the author of the second edition of QUAKER ARTISTS. He states: that: "The second edition of the book QUAKER ARTISTS contains the stories of lots of Quaker artists (he has a list of very famous people!!) - 286 reviews in all, a history of Friends, a history of Quaker art, study questions, artists queries, 44 reproductions of the artists' works, 51 illustrations, a bibliography, an alphabetical index and an artist's index. The period covered is 1659 to 2015. Friends from 18 different countries are included. Poets, painters, dancers, musicians, films and 13 other categories are included. QUAKER ARTISTS is an entertaining and celebratory read in it self but it has other uses, too: as a resource for study group, a reference for libraries, and a curriculum for First Day Schools.

### Update Your Light Bulbs and Support the Meeting and/or A Business

RIIPL (Rhode Island Interfaith Power and Light) has informed us that National Grid is sponsoring an innovative program to support lighting efficiency in homes and houses of worship. Through the Residential Lighting Program, Northeast Efficiency Supply is providing a variety of efficient lighting products at excellent prices. From now through December 31, for every light bulb or fixture you purchase, \$2 will be donated to the Meeting to fund its future lighting projects (the donations are for that restricted use). There is also a program for businesses along a similar model, so you might inform the people where you work.

The best bargains for common bulbs seem to be bulbs available for \$4 each, with \$2 going to our meeting's lighting projects. These are available as a standard A19 size bulb (9W=60 watt equivalent) and a BR30 Spot (flood light 11W=75 watt equivalent).

#### **CLERK'S CORNER** by Dan Lederer

Do Black Lives Matter?

Most of us at Providence Friends Meeting have enjoyed privileged lives. As children we weren't fearful of being hurt going to and from school, and we were able to play outside without the concern that our lives were in danger. The policeman was our friend. We were told that, with hard work and perseverance, we could achieve just about anything, which is to say we had access to The American Dream. I know I took all this for granted and spent little time wondering if I was deserving of this good fortune or worrying about whether anyone else had been left out..

On reflection it's clear that not everyone in our country shares this kind of happy experience, but what brought this home to me recently was a book recommended by Friends at NEYM Sessions. The book is "Between the World and Me", by Ta-Nehisi Coates, who is a 40 year old African-American man raised in one of Baltimore's rougher neighborhoods. He attended Howard University but dropped out to pursue a career in writing. Despite the lack of a degree, he has taught at MIT and CUNY and is now a national correspondent for The Atlantic.

The book provides a vivid glimpse of what it's like, here in our country, to be a member of a minority that has been subjected to oppression that has gone on in various forms for centuries, that continues to this day, and that is outside the experience of most Friends. Coates' thesis is that the destruction of black lives is an ongoing tradition that those in charge have viewed as essential, or at least have tolerated, in order to maintain their position of power. American history suggests that, outside the black community, black lives really haven't mattered. Coates articulates this and other truths about racial injustice in our culture that are jarring and that, for the most part, have been kept out of the public eye because they're not pretty and because facing them honestly may produce unpredictable changes in the status quo.

The book offers no easy solutions to the problems described, but don't let that dissuade you from reading it. Writing in the New York Times Book Review, Michelle Alexander, author of "The New Jim Crow: Mass Incarceration in the Age of Colorblindness", says, "Whether you agree or disagree, one of the great joys of reading Ta-Nehisi Coates is being challenged in ways you didn't expect or imagine." And on the book's jacket, Nobel laureate Toni Morrison writes, "This is required reading." Need I say more?

environmental and ethical consequences of over-consumption. In Rhode Island, as part of International Buy Nothing Day, we hold a winter coat exchange in various locations around the state, where people who can donate coats do so, and people who need coats pick them up. Volunteers are needed to help with this life-affirming event.

<u>At Meeting</u>, on Nov. 22, there will be a table or box downstairs for people to leave coats, and one of us will bring these to one of the exchanges in time for the Friday morning event. Collection and give away happen at several places around the state, and times may vary at different locations.

9 AM to 1 PM - The first location is in Providence on the State House Lawn - the brick patio across from the mall, with a rain location at Gloria Dei Lutheran Church (15 Hayes Street, Providence, a block behind the State House). Items for this can be dropped off in advance at Bell Street Chapel.

In Pawtucket the transfer of coats takes place at the Blackstone Valley Visitors Center. Events are also held at other locations in Rhode Island. There are many partners for this event: community organizations, places of worship, civic, and environmental groups.
