### Meeting for Worship with a Concern for Business, Minutes, 14th of 5<sup>th</sup> Month, 2017

1.We gathered at the Saylesville meetinghouse at 12:10 pm with 15 present. The clerk read the following queries from Philadelphia Yearly Meeting *Faith & Practice*:

What is our Meeting's role in the life and support of Friends' education? If supporting or maintaining a Friends school, have we developed an appropriate relationship of Meeting and school? What is our role in the spiritual life of the school and its maintenance of Friends' principles?

What does our Meeting do to support education in the wider community?

What help do we provide for the children and adults in our Meeting to pursue the education they seek, whether academic, technical, or vocational? Do we make provision for children in our Meeting to attend a Friends school?

### 2. Announcements:

Saylesville worship group invites all Friends to join in "Wonderful Wednesday" this coming Wednesday, the 17th of 5<sup>th</sup> month, with worship at 5:30, followed by a potluck meal and fellowship.

Ministry and Counsel invites those with thoughts about a memorial minute for Mary Barrett to speak with members of Ministry and Counsel.

3. Correspondence. We have received a note of thanks from Woolman Hill acknowledging our contribution.

4. **Religious Education.** Betsy Zimmerman reported for the Religious Education Committee. We are blessed by our children's exuberant presence. However, the committee is challenged by the large number of children at present, usually nine to seventeen in total. The largest group is ages four to seven, requiring three adults. There is also a large nursery group, so the younger group promises to be large for some time to come. It has been difficult to find enough adults to work with them, even with some paid helpers, and the committee is eager to hear from Friends willing to serve. The summer will be more informal, hoping that other adults will volunteer.

5. **Membership.** Recorder Elise Morse presented the annual Statistical Report that will be forwarded to New England Yearly Meeting. The report was approved, with permission to make minor adjustments as needed before sending it on.

6. **Saylesville preparative meeting**. Bruce Downing reported that the preparative meeting has held its final business meeting, including passing to the Property Committee the full responsibility for care of the Saylesville meetinghouse. They look forward to continuing as a precious worshipping community, and to welcoming members who normally worship at Providence, as well as others who are drawn to this site by its history and family connections. They thank the monthly meeting for its ongoing care of worship here.

7. We note that as of June 1, we will have new officers. We thank David Bourns for his years of service as clerk

of Ministry and Counsel, and thank Dan Lederer for his service as presiding clerk and assistant presiding clerk.

8. Rebecca Leuchak reported on yesterday's meeting of the **NEYM Permanent Board**. Friends Camp is seeing a large increase in applications, and the new director has been traveling among meetings to get to know families. Permanent Board began the day with a workshop on White Privilege, led by Lisa Graustein; white privilege is like the water that fish swim in but do not recognize. The yearly meeting continues to be concerned about financial support from meetings and individuals.

9. We adjourned at 1:00 pm, intending to meet next on the 11<sup>th</sup> of 6<sup>th</sup> month at the Providence meetinghouse, with the meetinghouse expansion as a significant agenda item. The clerk noted that no decision has been made on whether to continue to hold business meetings at the Saylesville meetinghouse.
