Gender Identity 101: An Information Session for Friends, March 25

In planning for Sessions 2016 and 2017, NEYM reflected on how it could better meet the needs of Friends with diverse gender identities. At the time, NEYM published a note on its website that stated, in part, "We recognize a growing understanding among Friends and in our wider society that our mainstream culture's view of gender is too restrictive for many people: a person's sex assigned at birth and their own experience of their gender identity are not necessarily the same thing. We are coming to see that forcing everyone to fit into one of two rigid gender categories ignores the truth of who many Friends in our community really are."

These concerns are relevant to us in Providence as well. On Sunday, March 25, after the rise of meeting, Lucy Churchill will lead our community in a presentation and discussion about gender identity - what it means, why it's important, and what allies can do to support friends of all genders. Providence Monthly Meeting for Worship with a Concern for Business Minutes, 11th of 3rd Month, 2018

1. We gathered at the Providence meetinghouse at 12:05 pm, with 21 present. During opening worship, Friends had an opportunity to review the following queries from Philadelphia Yearly Meeting's *Faith and Practice*, which had been read during meeting for worship:

Spiritual Nurture, Ministry, and Religious Education

- Does our Meeting encourage the ministry of both word and deed? How does our Meeting recognize, develop, and nurture the gifts of our members and attenders of all ages?
- Does our Meeting prepare all its members and children for worship and for a way of life consistent with the principles of the Religious Society of Friends? How do we teach about Quaker practices in business and worship and their importance to the functioning of our Meeting community?
- In what ways do we support each other in order to seek God's will and act upon our understanding of truth? Is there opportunity in our Meeting to share the excitement of religious discovery and the possibility of religious transformation?

2. Announcements:

NEYM's next "Living Faith" Gathering will be held 14th of 4th Month in Portland, Maine.

Quarterly Meeting will be held on the 18th of this month at Worcester Friends Meeting.

Moses Brown School will be hosting a week of advocacy on behalf of refugees, including a family benefit concert by Peter and Annie Blood-Patterson on April 5. The Peace and Social Action Committee agreed to co-sponsor the concert, and encourages all Friends to attend,

3. Correspondence

We have received a letter from Moses Brown granting approval for digging on their portion of the property related to our building expansion project.

We have received a check from Obadiah Brown's Benevolent Fund in the amount of \$15,000 in support of our building expansion project. The clerk has responded with a letter of thanks.

4. Elsie Morse, the meeting recorder, presented the membership statistical report as of year-end 2017. It is difficult to keep track of which children are junior members. Some of the other categories would be more useful if they included both members and attenders. We note a new category in the NEYM form this year, for persons "identifying with other gender identities." A question was raised whether it would be useful to have a membership committee with oversight over all questions of membership; this may be discussed by Ministry and Counsel. A copy of the report will be attached to the record copy

of these minutes.

- 5. For Ministry and Counsel, Ariana Steele brought a recommendation that Sally Freestone be accepted into membership, following the usual clearness process. We approve. Paul Graseck agreed to coordinate an appropriate welcome for her.
- 6. Ministry and Counsel has brought a draft of the annual State of the Society report. Some minor typographical suggestions were offered. We find the content of the report clear, well-organized, and an accurate reflection of the life of the meeting. We approve this report, with leeway to Ministry and Counsel to make minor editorial changes.
- 7. The Library Committee has brought a request for approval to deaccession some 200 old books from a cabinet at the Saylesville meetinghouse. The committee has inventoried these books, few of which are suitable for the meeting's current needs. They expect to look for suitable repositories for these items. The committee asks for authority to dispose of them appropriately, rather than business meeting approving each individual item. We approve, with thanks to the Library Committee. We also approve the Library Committee conducting a similar inventory and deaccessioning of older books at the Providence meetinghouse, as way may open.
- 8. In the absence of the treasurer, Dan Lederer presented the treasurer's financial report for the third quarter of the fiscal year, ending February 28, 2018. Contributions are slightly above the prior year figure. This does not include donations restricted for the building expansion. We have withdrawn \$300,000 from the NEYM Pooled Funds, which has been moved into cash reserves for payment of expenses relating to the building expansion. An additional \$300,000 is expected to be withdrawn later this year for the balance of the project.

He noted that the Providence electric bill has been much higher than anticipated, because of use of the heat exchanger units in the meeting room. In theory, these are reducing gas usage. The overage exceeds what the treasurer is authorized to pay. The Finance Committee requests permission for the treasurer to exceed the budgeted figure by up to \$800 as needed to cover electric bills as incurred for the balance of the year. We approve.

9. For the Finance Committee, Dan Lederer presented a draft budget for FY 2019, for comments. The expanded building is likely to require increases in operating and maintenance costs, including an increase in the maintenance reserve. It will take at least a year to know precisely what the new expenses will be. At the same time, we will need to withdraw a significant amount from General Fund reserves, reducing undesignated investment income for the foreseeable future. These changes were anticipated at the time we reached clarity to move forward with the expansion. The committee is recommending prudent cuts to a number of other items to partially offset these changes. The budget as presented would require general contributions increasing by about one-third, to about \$73,000. In

theory that should be manageable given the size of our membership and attendance, although we recognize that not all Friends are able to contribute significantly.

A question was raised whether the meeting needs to continue covering operating costs for the Saylesville meetinghouse, and whether Ruggiero bequest could be used to cover routine operating expenses for the Saylesville meetinghouse. The Finance Committee noted that the bequest is restricted to maintenance rather than operating costs. The Treasurer's policy is to draw from the bequest fund for any expenses that fit within the terms of the bequest. The ad hoc committee to consider the future of the Saylesville meetinghouse is exploring many options and will be reporting shortly. In the meantime, pending any further decisions, it seems prudent to continue to exercise good stewardship over the building.

It may be possible to increase the income from use of both meetinghouses, if adequate volunteers come forward to have oversight of that use.

Friends were encouraged to forward additional comments and concerns to the Finance Committee, which will bring a revised proposal for approval next month.

9. No other business appearing, we closed with a period of silent worship 2:20 pm, intending to meet next on the 8th of 4th month, God willing.

First Day School Updates, Early 2018

First Day School during January considered what it's like to be a refugee. We looked at videos of the storm destruction on Puerto Rico to understand why refugees from the island are arriving in Rhode Island. We read stories, among them one that helped us think about what most meaningful and useful things we would take if we had to fit these things in a suitcase. We heard from Hans-Dieter Gomes about his experience as a refugee. Mayss Bajbouj from AHOPE visited and asked us to consider what it's like to live in a refugee tent city. We packed bags of personal health items and school supplies that were generously donated by our Meeting community. These and your donations of clothing, diapers, and kitchenware were given to AHOPE.

In February, we gave our FDS families each a copy of *A Pathway to Quaker Parenting*, a parenting resource that is based on Quaker testimonies and on query-based self guidance. We are exploring the testimonies of Quakers, beginning with Equality and Equity. We look forward to talking to others in our community about these ideas.

Our older students are reviewing films they find engaging and will be sharing those film experiences with each other. We appreciate the commitment of adults to be able to offer two Sundays a month for early-teen gatherings.
