News from the Providence Monthly Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends

Providence Monthly Meeting for Worship with a Concern for Business 10th of 6th Month, 2018 <u>Minutes</u>

1. Friends gathered at the Saylesville meetinghouse at noon, with 20 present. Assistant presiding clerk Dan Lederer began the period of silent worship by reading the following queries taken from Pacific Yearly Meeting: Do I live in thankful awareness of God's constant presence in my life? Am I sensitive and obedient to the leadings of the Holy Spirit? What steps am I taking to center my life and to stay open to continuing revelation?

2. The following announcements were read:

This year's NEYM Sessions will be from August 4 through August 9 at Castleton University, Castleton, Vermont. Registration is currently open at neym.org/sessions.

The impacts of contemporary economic changes and the needs of individuals and families are all around us. We sense the need, but ask, "What can I do?" Much as we ask this question today, Stephen Aldrich asked and responded in the 1800s by bequeathing a large portion of his estate to the R.I.-Smithfield Quarterly Meeting to provide emergency funding for Friends in need. This bequest continues today as the Stephen Aldrich Fund and is available to all members of the Meeting community seeking one-time emergency financial assistance. 3. For the Communications Committee, Dan Lederer brought a proposal for a policy regarding the publicizing of Meeting events. After minor editing, Friends approved the following: *Communications Committee maintains three online means for Friends to communicate items of interest to our Meeting community - the Meeting Email List also known as "the listserve," the Meeting Website, and the Meeting newsletter. The committee proposes that online publicizing of Meeting activities be via these means of communication whenever possible. There has been concern about the use of the Internet, and especially social media, to publicize Meeting events in other ways. Friends may reference a Meeting event on social media as long as they do so as individuals rather than as representing Meeting itself.*

4. Treasurer Peter Swaszek brought the year-end report on the Meeting's

finances. They are good. Contributions this year, not including those made to the building fund, reached a record \$53,000 and we ended the year approximately \$800 in the black. Peter noted that expenses will rise next year as construction progresses and that next year's budget will call for increased contributions. He also noted that this is an unaudited report, and that any corrections will be presented in September. We note that it will be desirable to track income derived from the Saylesville meetinghouse separately from that from Providence and ask the treasurer to make this possible. We receive the report with thanks.

5. Bruce Carlsten reported on the progress of the Providence meetinghouse expansion project. Much has taken place since the last report, including negotiations with contractors, arrangements with Moses Brown School concerning gas lines and drainage, and the unexpected discovery that the City of Providence has a "paper road" between our meetinghouse and the Moses Brown playing fields. Delays caused by these issues caused the loss of some subcontractors, but all now seems to be in place for moving forward, and the date of completion is now estimated for late October. Although the contractor has agreed to keep one bathroom available for our use, it would save time and money if we forego that option and make other arrangements for one to two weeks in late July. Friends agreed to allow the Building committee to proceed accordingly. We thank the committee for much hard work.

6. Bruce Downing reported on recent and planned activities at the Saylesville meetinghouse. With help from Friends from both the Saylesville and Providence worship communities, a considerable amount of general "sprucing up" has taken place to deal with clutter and make the space more inviting. Meeting for worship is being held regularly at 10:30 on first-day mornings with members of Ministry and Counsel attending, the meetinghouse is open for bookswap and tours on the third seventh-day of each month, and steps are being taken to make the site better known and more visible to the public. A recent marriage event held in conjunction with Hearthside House was successful, tomatoes and flowers have been planted, and other events are being planned, including a meeting of the Rhode Island Rights group on Sixth-month 17, shape-note singing on Sixth- month 23, an information table and open house for Lincoln's Heritage Celebration on Seventh-month 22, and something similar for Great Road Day on Ninth-month 22. Requests for volunteer help will some of these events will be sent out on the listserve. All Friends are invited to participate in both meetings for worship and special events. Finance Committee is currently overseeing events at Saylesville; anyone who may be involved in planning an event or meeting, or volunteering for a planned event, is reminded to contact Dan Lederer.

7. For the Peace and Social Action Committee, Steven Schwartz reported that the committee has been concentrating this past year on climate change, refugee issues, and issues involving our local community. Donations totaling \$5,500 were made to eleven groups: AHOPE, PrYSM AMOR (refugee work), Camp Street Ministries, Institute for the Study and Practice of Non-Violence, Islamic School of R.I., Dorcas International Institute of R.I., Environmental Council R.I., Central Falls High School ELO "How to Change the World", Pride Day table and parade, Rhode Island Coalition for the Homeless, Syrian American Medical Society. Steve shared information about the work supported by these donations. A concern was raised that FCNL was not included. This has in the past been supported by Peace and Social Action and we note that members of our Meeting have been active with an FCNL advocacy group. The committee will consider it for the current fiscal year.

We thank the committee for its work.

No further business appearing, we closed with a period of silent worship at 1:20 p.m., intending to meet next on the 9th of Ninth- month at noon at Saylesville.
