Providence Monthly Meeting for Worship with a Concern for Business 12th of Fourth Month, 2020 Minutes

Friends gathered by means of Zoom computer technology a little before noon with 21 present. Presiding clerk Rebecca Leuchak began the period of silent worship by reading the following queries taken from Old Chatham Monthly Meeting, Old Chatham, N.Y. (http://www.oldchathamquakers.org/advices-and-queries.html)

Do we make ourselves available in a tender and caring way when we sense a need for assistance in time of trouble? Do we trust each other enough to make our needs known to someone in our meeting?

The clerk read announcements concerning the life of the meeting.

For Nominating Committee, Dan Lederer brought recommendations for the membership of Meeting committees for the year beginning on Sixth month 1, 2020. Friends approved.

Treasurer Peter Swaszek brought a report on the Meeting's finances as of Third month 2020. Income so far has been greater than expenses. Contribution income is somewhat higher than at this time last year, and a number of memorial donations were received. Investment figures also look good but do not reflect the recent financial impact of the pandemic. Friends thank Peter for this report.

For the Finance Committee, Steve Thomas brought a proposed budget for the coming fiscal year. Due to the use of invested funds for work on our Providence property and to the current financial downturn, our investment income is expected to be reduced. The Finance Committee is recommending a budget which is \$3,000 less than last year's and which also decreases considerably our usual contribution to New England Yearly Meeting and the amount we would ideally set aside for future needs of the Providence meetinghouse. Friends expressed concern about both these proposed reductions. After some discussion, Friends approved the proposed budget.

For Ministry and Counsel, Bruce Shaw brought a proposal that the Meeting establish a fund to assist members of our Meeting community dealing with financial difficulties due to the COVID – 19 pandemic. Friends approved proposal as follows:

Meeting will establish a fund to assist Friends in our Meeting community who are facing financial difficulties due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The fund will be maintained by our Meeting treasurer, and contributions to the fund will be confidential. A small subcommittee, three or more persons appointed by Ministry and Counsel, will determine the distribution of financial assistance to needy Friends. The subcommittee will invite

Friends to apply for assistance and will ask those who apply to provide the reason for the request and the amount requested. The identities of Friends requesting assistance and the amounts granted to each will be kept confidential, but the subcommittee or the treasurer will report to Meeting for Business on a regular basis regarding the amount collected from donations, the amount distributed, and the balance in the fund. When the sense of the subcommittee is that there is no longer a need for the fund, the subcommittee will make a recommendation to Ministry and Counsel regarding the disposition of any remaining balance.

No further business appearing, we closed with a period of silent worship at 1:45 p.m., intending to meet next on the 10th of Fifth month.

Think of this column as a match-making service for our terrific library books that are missing being out in circulation.

A note about who might be included in future columns. As Leonard Kenworthy explains in his

introduction to the anthology *Living in the Light*, "Reading about these individuals should not discourage us; it should encourage us. The men and women portrayed here are among the Everests, Matterhorns, and Kilimanjaros of Quakerism. But the world is not composed solely of mountain peaks; it includes lesser mountains, hills, valleys, and plains. Humanity desperately needs common as well as uncommon individuals, ordinary as well as extraordinary people, inconspicuous as well as conspicuous men and women." (pp. 3-4)

I first came across Rufus Jones in the 1985 edition of *Faith and Practice* while preparing for my Secular Spirituality class at RISD. As someone who had not had direct experiences of a spiritual God, as my Missionary Baptist Grandmother could, I felt reassured by Jones' testimony from his early life that connection with the spiritual realm may be more of a subtle reassurance than an exclamation.

"I had no ecstatic experiences, I was subject to no miraculous seeming revelations, no sharp break occurred in the unfolding steps of a normal and ordinary life... I have few epoch-dates to record, and no single Damascus vision. What I do feel sure of, however, is a frequent influx of divine life and power--the warm intimate touch of a guiding Hand. I somehow felt all through those college years that I was being *prepared for something*." (Faith and Practice, p. 24, (1985).

Clerk's Corner: The Embrace of Community

As a career long academic, I live in a world where asking big questions and researching the world for answers is the primary foundation for teaching and learning. During this extraordinary time we find ourselves in, I am aware of how professional Epidemiologists who study from a medical perspective the incidence, spread and control of disease, and Sociologists who study from a psychological perspective the behaviors of humans in societies, are primed to do great work that will soon enlighten us all. This is an exciting time for finding answers to big questions!

While I am not in either of those fields, one thing on my mind always is the ways that we as individuals seek to build community. And I have been thinking about that even more than usual for over a month now. The shelter-at-home conditions under which we all now live bring me to the question of "What happens when the patterns of our familiar daily activity abruptly and radically shift?

It is clear to me that the degree to which we can weather this storm of viral contagion, and the changes it has brought to our lives, is precisely in relation to the strength of community that we feel. Some of us have families, some of us have housemates, some of us live alone.

What we all have in common at Providence Monthly Meeting is a faith community that brings us as individuals into relation with each other in deeply spiritual, intentional, and defined ways. By joining in community in the Society of Friends, we, as individuals, have made the decision to be connected to each other. We are members of this community and the full depth of that statement has, in this time of crisis, come more sharply into focus for me. I have seen that sense of connection, that love for each other in our community, growing among us over the years. I have seen how much this sense of being a community has the power to support individuals. We live within the care of our Meeting community – both when we are givers and when we are receivers of that care.

In the past few weeks, we have initiated a number of ways to be in touch with this strong and loving community. Weekly worship on Sundays at our regular hour, social time afterward and also on Wednesday mornings at 11:00 a.m., Friendly Phoners group for daily check-ins with Friends, Seekers group on the third Sunday of every month at 8:45 a.m., and a Tuesday evening group for discussion. All these gatherings are virtual using Zoom.

If you are reading this and feeling somehow that you are not connected, I would urge you to get in touch. Reach out for help, our Meeting community is here for you!

And for all of us, my deepest wish is that we may work to strengthen our connection, our empathy, and our compassion in order to support each other.
