Providence Monthly Meeting for Worship with a Concern for Business 8th of Fifth Month, 2022 Minutes

Friends gathered via Zoom technology at 12:15 with 13 present. Presiding clerk Victoria Ekk began the period of silent worship by reading the following queries taken from Philadelphia Yearly Meeting's *Faith and Practice*, queries on Deepening our Faith: section on Meeting for Business:

• Is our meeting for business held in worship in which we seek divine guidance?

• How do we sustain prayerful consideration of all aspects of an issue and address difficult problems with a search for truth that is unhurried by the pressures of time?

• Do I remain open to personal transformation as the community arrives at the sense of the meeting?

The clerk read announcements concerning the life of the meeting. The following items of business were brought forward:

1. Concerning the "Neighborhood Convening for Healing and Mutual Support," Victoria reported that the group is developing methods of communication among people in the area and plans to work on learning what needs exist.

2. Our member Betsy Cazden, currently assistant clerk of Friends World Committee for Consultation, plans travel to Paris for the annual meeting of the Europe and Middle East Section. We have prepared a Letter of Introduction (attached) for her and ask Friends to hold her and the European situation in the Light.

3. For Ministry and Counsel Committee, Dan Lederer brought a request to add Mike Hirtle to the Committee beginning June 1. Friends approved.

4. Ministry and Counsel Committee brought forward a memorial minute for our Friend Al Dahlberg (attached). Friends approved.

5. For Ministry and Counsel Committee, Sam Schifman brought the attached report on the State of

our Society in 2021. Friends approved.

6. For Ministry and Counsel and Providence Meetinghouse Management Committees, Dan Lederer brought the following proposal concerning the formats to be used for Meeting for Worship: *Meeting for Worship will continue in the Providence meetinghouse with the requirements of proof of full vaccination, mask wearing, and social distancing. Weather permitting, Friends may choose to worship outdoors informally. Online worship will continue at the same time, with combined in-person and online worship taking place every other week. This format will be re-visited at Meeting for Business no later than September 2022. Friends approved.*

7. Peace and Social Action Committee has proposed that our Meeting communicate with the City Council of Providence through the organization Back from the Brink by endorsing the following statement regarding U. S. Government policy on nuclear weapons: **actively pursuing a verifiable agreement among nuclear armed states to eliminate their nuclear arsenals;*

*renouncing the option of using nuclear weapons first;

* ending the sole, unchecked authority of any US president to launch a nuclear attack;

* taking US nuclear weapons off hair-trigger alert; and

* canceling the plan to replace the entire US nuclear arsenal with enhanced weapons."

Friends approved. The Committee also suggested that the Meeting become a partner of the Back from the Brink group; after discussion, Friends did not have unity to take that step.

No further business appearing, we closed with a period of silent worship at 1:30 p.m., intending to meet next on the 12th of Sixth month.

Poor People's Campaign March on Washington June 18

Our Peace and Social Action Committee (P&SA) is informing our meeting community to please consider participating in the march and getting others to do so. The two key requests are to join the march and to help with outreach by becoming a "Mobilizing Captain"

"The Poor People's Campaign: A National Call For Moral Revival" was started around 2017 as a continuation of the 1960's Civil Rights movement that marched on Washington for Jobs and Freedom. On Saturday, June 18, 2022, they are holding a nationwide March on Washington to address these interlocking injustices:

- Systemic racism
- Systemic poverty
- · Ecological devastation and the denial of healthcare
- Militarism and the war economy
- The false moral narrative of religious nationalism

They are particularly looking for Mobilizing Captains to help inform organizations and networks and bring friends and families as part of the delegation from Rhode Island. Pamela Poniatowski, the state campaign chairman for the Poor People's Campaign, spoke at a recent P&SA meeting. She is scheduling events and Zoom meetings to spread the word to as many people as possible, and is happy to talk with anyone who can help. P&SA is asking our meeting and community members to participate in getting as many people as possible to join the march.

Are You Car-Light?

As automobile-owning Ocean Staters continue to pay high prices for gasoline, there are more incentives than ever before to be car-light or car-free. Friends have an historical affinity for travel on foot, going back to England and Wales. Modern Quakers look for green travel solutions, often opting to live where they work and to work where they live.

Whether the place one calls home is one of Rhode Island's quaint villages, or tailored suburbs, or our very own capital city, one can take some baby steps to driving less--especially to driving less in single-occupant vehicles. When I started my journey to car-free, I chose those walkable and bikeable errands that I could do around town. One-sack grocery trips. Mailing a small package. Walking to the Avon Theater for a matinee. Here on Providence's East Side, I meet parents who have purchased/modified bicycles which are capable of toting along small passengers plus a few grocery sacks. Senior citizens (like me!) travel on RIPTA buses or RIPTA RIDE special needs transit. And everybody rides those motorized scooters.

Climate scientists have determined that these short, car-free, upstream trips have an outsized effect on traffic congestion downstream. That seems erroneous! If one stays in one's own community to run an errand, why would it matter if one walks or bikes or takes the bus or drives to that errand? Well, apparently, one less car on the road has an effect locally...and further down the roadway. Your car-light decision matters. A lot. Especially for greenhouse gas emissions.

The RI House of Representatives is currently proposing to fund two major improvement projects for bicycle and transit travel in the Ocean State. I've seen the plans, and this could mean that your not-so-walkable suburb might get a lot better! Bond issues could be on the ballot by November 2022.

I look forward to seeing all of you soon – at the Meeting House or on Zoom – and hearing about your car-light experiences.
