Providence Monthly Meeting for Worship with a Concern for Business 11th of Second Month, 2024 Minutes

Friends gathered at the Providence meetinghouse at noon with 12 present and three on Zoom.

Presiding clerk Ariana Steele began the period of silent worship by reading the following queries taken from New England Yearly Meeting's *Advices and Queries:*

Do you maintain an appropriate balance among work, service, worship, family, and recreation? Are you ready to rest if God asks it of you?

A memorial service for our member Carla Dowben will be held at Providence Meetinghouse on Saturday 2/24/24 at 11 AM. It will also be accessible by Zoom. The following items of business were brought forward:

1. Ministry and Counsel Committee reported that a clearness committee consisting of Elsie Morse, Betsy Cazden, and Paul Graseck has met with Alexandra Leonard and they recommend that she be accepted as a member of our society. Friends approved and appointed the aforementioned Friends to organize a suitable welcome for Alex.

2. Ministry and Counsel committee recommended adding Thia Lord to fill the vacancy on that committee. Friends approved.

3. The Finance Committee brought a draft budget for the 2024-2025 fiscal year. There is some confusion about how the cost of teenage helpers is to be divided between the Nursery Child Care and Religious Education Committees. There was discussion about the variety of ways in which the Meeting makes donations to other Quaker and non-Quaker organizations; Friends suggested that we consider increasing our charitable contributions. The line for the Providence meetinghouse reserve fund has been greater in the last few years than the amount recommended by the reserve study that was done some years ago. In discussion, we noted that it may be time for an updated

study and we asked Property Committee to take this step. We thank the Finance Committee for their work and anticipate receiving a revised version of the budget at a future meeting.

No further business appearing, we closed with a period of silent worship at 1:25 p.m., intending to meet next on the 10th of Third month.

On Being Your Own Best Friend

As Quakers, we're asked during silent worship to listen to that still, small voice that will guide us to righteous action. But are we really expected to hear an actual voice, or is this just a metaphor for the thoughts that arise out of silence?

In answer to that question I suggest trying the following exercise in role-playing: Imagine someone with all the attributes you would want in a best friend, someone who is attentive, non-judgmental, supportive, wise, and kind. Then have a conversation with this friend, speaking your own words as well as the words of your friend. It's OK to say whatever's on your mind, since nothing will be divulged to anyone else. Nothing you say to this discreet friend can cause you embarrassment or shame, so there's no need to keep any secrets. And you needn't be afraid of rejection or of what might be said in response, since you're in control of both sides of the conversation. One tip: This works best when spoken out loud, so a private setting is optimal.

Now you may be saying to yourself, "Wait a second. I don't have all those sterling qualities, so how can I play that role." But the fact is that you do have those qualities. Circumstances may prevent them from being apparent in every instance, but we all have the capacity to be that kind of best friend.

Although you can check in with this friend at any time, the interchange may be most productive when you're distressed about something. For example, the source of your discomfort may be an emotion that you're not proud of, such as jealousy, envy, or anger, but this friend isn't going to judge you harshly, so you can let down your guard. You are in control, and you can determine that the friend first comforts you and then offers you the best advice he or she can muster.

So is what I'm suggesting in the realm of spirituality, a way to get in touch with "that of God" in ourselves, or is it just pop psychology? I'll leave that up to you to decide. However, I can say with certainty that it's a great way to practice being the best version of yourself, and to rehearse being a wonderful friend to anyone who crosses your path.
