The clerk reported that Kenyan peace activist Getry Agizah will speak at the Providence meetinghouse on Fifth month 23 in the evening, possibly preceded by a potluck dinner.

The following items of business were brought forward:

1. Rebecca Leuchak reported on plans for the Carla Dowben estate sale to be held on Sixth month 8 from 9:00 to 3:00 at the meetinghouse and possibly at Phebe Howland's garage, with a preview on the evening of Sixth month 7. Proceeds will benefit community and social justice causes. Additional items may be donated on Wednesday the 5th between noon and 5:00, and volunteers are needed. 2. For Adult Religious Education Committee, Laura Landon reported that an "Elements of

Our Friends Committee on National Legislation Advocacy Team has been working with other teams across the country to shift our country's war economy to a peace economy. We work to build public awareness and lobby members of Congress to advocate for a more peaceful world. If your top concern is the environment and climate change, you should know that the U.S. military is the largest institutional greenhouse gas emitter in the world. And if your top priority is gun violence, consider how our reliance on military responses to problems encourages more violent responses to conflict at all levels of society. And if your main concern is affordable housing, education, mental health, etc., please know that the more we spend on our military, the less we have available for everything else.

Let's find ways to work together. We'd love to have you join us! We meet on Zoom and can find roles for those with little time or who are uncomfortable with the thought of lobbying. You can join us for a virtual lobby visit without having to say anything; just showing up as a constituent is enough.
